

The Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship

January 1, 2026 is the deadline to submit your application for an **Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship**. This scholarship provides funds for various aviation training and research opportunities, including:

- · Additional pilot certificate or rating
- Advancement in an aviation or aerospace field
- Technical aviation training or certification
- Emergency Maneuvers Training

Members of The 99s who joined on or before January 1 of 2025 may apply (the exception is Emergency Maneuvers Training where one year of membership is not necessary). Other requirements such as flight and medical currency must be met to qualify for flight training. Read more about the scholarships and requirements in the instructions at the link below.

Attention Student Pilots!

The fall First Wings Award deadline is 1 October. If you are a student pilot who has been a member of the 99s since on or before 1 July 2025, and have logged at least five hours of flight training in the six months prior to the application deadline of October 1st, you may qualify for an award of up to \$6000. An updated version of the application will be available on the international website on or about 1 September.

If you are preparing to apply here are some tips:

- Download the application before filling any fields the online form does not save any information you enter. Read the instructions carefully. Where bullet points are part of the instructions, be sure to cover those points at minimum a little bit extra will be fine, too.
- If you need a mentor (any 99s member can help you!), contact Jane Link to help you find one.
- The 99s Recommendation and Certification pages (Part VII and VIII) are completed by the Chapter scholarship chairman, Jane Link, after the application is submitted.
- The Colorado Chapter is in the South Central Section.
- Necessary documents may be captured on a phone or scanner, but make sure they are complete, clean, readable and straight as possible.
- Email your application to the Chapter AEMFS chairman, Jane Link no later than 1 October

A Colorado CFI's Advice: Flying in the Front Range

How to stay Sane in Colorado's Airspace Maze

Greetings again and happy October! My name is Kate Yorga. I'm a corporate jet pilot, but I was a CFI in the Denver area for about two years. One of the most challenging things I have found about flying around Denver is navigating the complex maze of air-

spaces and airports.

Denver Airport (DEN) is now the 6th busiest airport in the world, carrying about 83 million passengers a year. As you might expect, the airspace surrounding DEN is tightly controlled. This Class Bravo airspace is the most restrictive type of airspace. In order to operate within this airspace you need an explicit clearance, which is extremely rare to general aviation traffic due to the volume of commercial traffic.

The Class Bravo airspace is structured in layers. The outer shelves are the tallest, often sitting around 9,000 feet MSL, and gradually lowering as you get closer into the airport. Busting a shelf can happen easily if



you're not paying attention to your altitude and position. During my time in the area, I relied heavily on the VFR sectional chart, communication with ATC approach and departure controllers, as well as pre-flight planning/routing!

Tips for success:

- Refer to the VFR sectional and find waypoints that help you stay outside of the Bravo shelves!
- Maintain 500 feet above or below the shelves if possible to allow an altitude buffer.
- Use VFR flight following!
- Refine your radio communication by practicing and using clear and concise calls!
- Use onboard GPS/moving maps to help with situational awareness! (But be sure to check for 100% accuracy of points and shelves before trusting these)
- Practice radio calls and standard procedures by listening and "responding" on LiveATC

Class Bravo Airspace

Some of the more nuanced challenges in the Denver area come from how Bravo airspace interacts with nearby airports. Take Colorado Air and Space Port (CFO), for example. The start of the Bravo shelf is only a mile away from the approach and departure end of the runway! It's very easy to accidentally enter the Bravo without realizing it, because it's near a critical phase of flight and so close to the runway! It's crucial to use ground-based waypoints to define the edge of the shelf, and ATC is there to assist you as needed.

Airports like Centennial (APA) pose another specific challenge. Not only is there a surrounding Class B shelf, it is also one of the busiest general aviation airports in the country! With a mix of corporate jets, flight school trainers, helicopters, and privately owned aircraft all sharing the same space, it's easy to get overwhelmed. The radio frequencies are constantly busy, and if you fall behind on your communication, it's easy to fall behind the aircraft as well. Some tips for surviving airspaces like this is to practice concise, clear radio calls



with another qualified pilot or instructor. You can also listen to LiveATC to understand the flow of traffic and help improve how you respond. Fun fact: Centennial is the 3rd busiest GA airport in the country with about 300,000 flight operations every year!

For pilots new to Class B airspace, the idea of entering it for the first time can be intimidating. But it's also very rewarding. To enter Class B, you must request and receive an explicit clearance. You must hear the words: "Cleared into the Class Bravo airspace." Without that clearance, you are not authorized to enter. You'll also need specific equipment onboard your aircraft! You'll need a two-way radio, a Mode C transponder, and ADS-B Out capability. And if you're a student pilot, you must have the proper Class B endorsement in your logbook before entering any Bravo airspace.

Flying in the Denver area can feel overwhelming at first, but with solid preparation and awareness, it becomes a valuable training ground. Whether you're a student learning to manage complex communications or a seasoned pilot fine-tuning your situational awareness, Colorado's airspace will challenge and sharpen your skills. Happy flying!


