Did you know that the 2024 race will be ending in Northern Colorado at KFNL?! This premier women's aviation event will be celebrated right here in our community.



Scholarship application tips by Jane Link

Scholarships are abundant and the number available grows each year. In addition you can find ample tips to help you compose an inspiring essay (if one is needed) or answer questions in an interesting way. Great information can be found on The Ninety-Nines resources section of the international website as well as other chapter websites such as the Ventura County 99s website under their scholarships selection (<u>https://www.vc99s.org</u>). There you have access to a collection of tips and a listing of other scholarships. Also, Sporty's Flight Training Central (<u>https://flighttrainingcentral.com/scholarships/</u>) has a new page of tips and links to organizations that offer scholarships.

Here are items of emphasis from my experience:

Completing the application

- 1. Read and understand all of the instructions and supporting information that deal with the application!
- 2 Check spelling and grammar thoroughly. Judges look for good communication skills and evaluate your application on those as well.

Writing your essay(or answering questions)

- 1. If you're applying for a few scholarships, be sure to modify your essay to suit each one and it's a good idea to specify the scholarship name in your essay so that the judges know that you're putting a good-faith effort into your application.
- 2. Be forthright regarding your financial needs clearly state what your status is and how you're managing your finances so that you can afford flight training.

Getting your recommendation(s)

- 1. Ask someone who knows your character well so they speak to your strengths and achievements. The Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarship (AEMS) and First Wings Awards request that the person who recommends you does not address your flying abilities, but rather other aspects of your life.
- 2. Use recent recommendation letters, and not any that are over a year old. Make sure they address the judging committee and are signed.

Required documents

- 1. When using your phone to take pictures of your documents use clips or other gadgets to avoid getting your hands in the frame. Make sure all images are legible, straight and flat as possible.
- 2. If your logbook is a traditional two-page-per-line version, take the left page image then the right page image and paste those images into a document with the images 'stacked'.
- 3. Total all logbook columns with numbers in them. If the page is complete, sign the testament of accuracy. If the page isn't complete use a pencil to total the carried forward numbers with the current page numbers so you can erase the pencil markings and continue to use the page. Be sure the year column is labeled accurately.
- 4. Verify that you have signed your medical and pilot certificates. Make the images of those as large as possible. You may want to paste those into a document as well to save as a pdf.

Mentors

- 1. Any 99 member can be a mentor for the purpose of offering advice and encouragement and monitoring your progress it's an honor to help a young aviator achieve their goal. A 99 who mentors a First Wings pilot also signs an agreement for the purpose validating completion of milestones for the trustees to send reimbursement to the First Wings student.
- 2. By attending board meetings and events you provide yourself with an opportunity for members to meet you and ask questions. This helps both your prospective mentor and you.

Unlike other scholarships, the Amelia Earhart scholarships and awards enable you to fix possible errors since the application goes to a chapter officer who reviews the application. After the application has been evaluated, and corrections made if needed, a chapter recommendation is written and the application goes to the section level and then to the national level. External judges review the applications and rank-order them. The ordered applications are issued awards by the trustees until the allotted amount of funds for that interval is exhausted. The awards are announced on the published date and a short biography with a picture is requested to share in the *Ninety-Nines* magazine.
